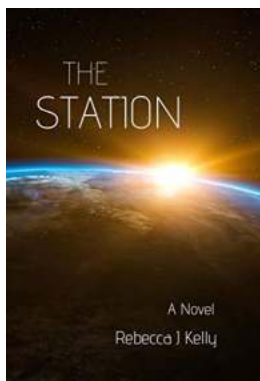

The Mountain School is insightful, candid, at times adaptive and at times rebellious. It is the ultimate tale of the transplant.



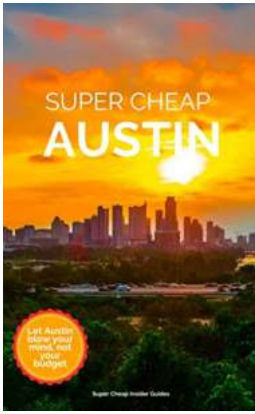
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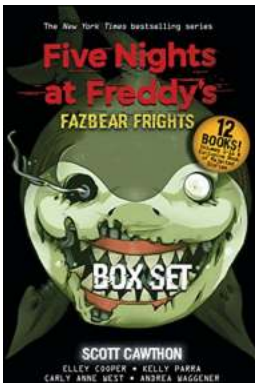
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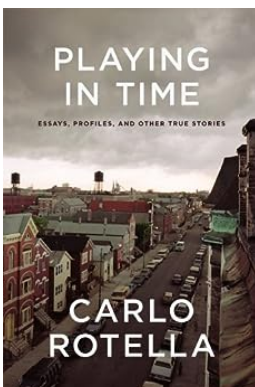
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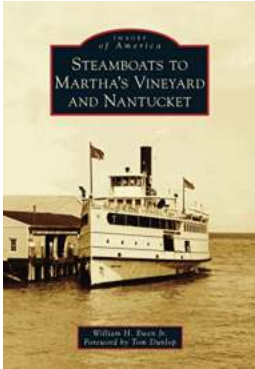
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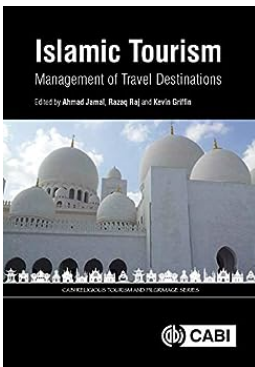
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
