and outside of the classroom and offers a more nuanced portrait of what the struggle to truly "make a difference" looks like.



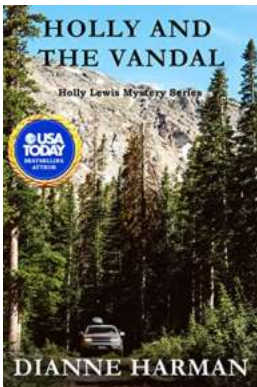
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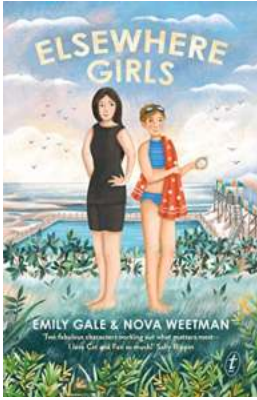
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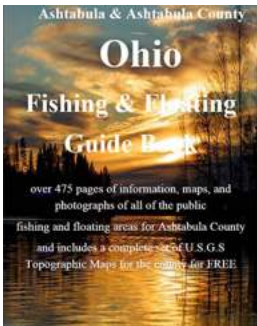
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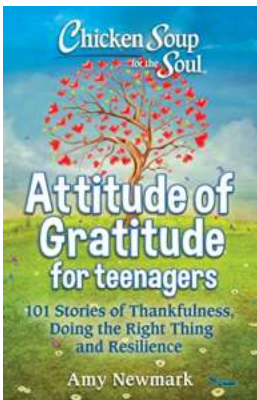
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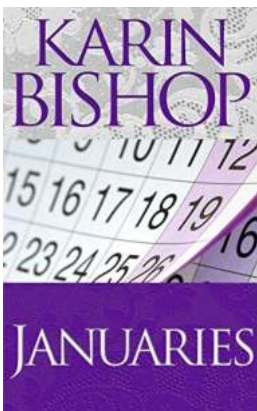
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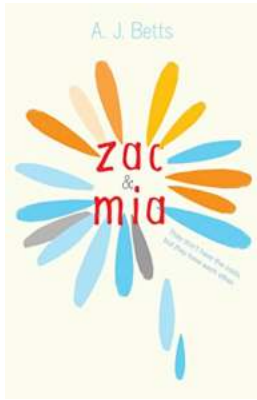
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
