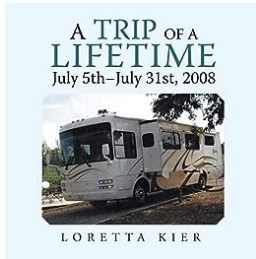

temples of Luxor and cruising the Nile River allowed us to delve deeper into the country's fascinating history.

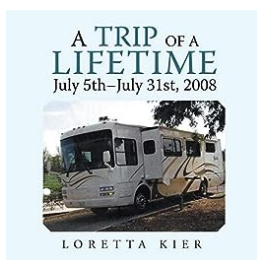
