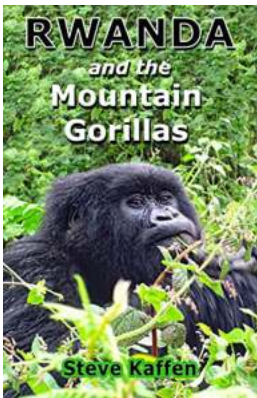

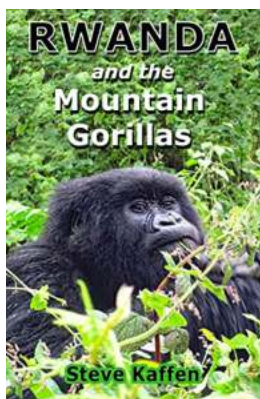

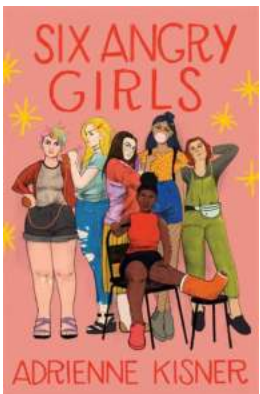
public service on the last Saturday of the month, when all Rwandans engage in volunteer work for the betterment of their communities.
